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Message from the President

Hello PMMA family and friends! I hope everyone is having a great summer, as we now gradually emerge from more than a year-long lockdown. I imagine this is probably how Noah and his passengers must have felt when they finally disembarked from their ark, to once again step on dry land.

I write this after just having participated in the Philippine Independence Day online celebration hosted by the FCO (Filipino Community Organizations). It is a great reminder of how much of what we now enjoy (and likely take for granted) we owe to men and women of previous generations who gave their all for their country at her time of greatest need. Last month, the UPAM (University of the Philippines Alumni in Minnesota) conducted an educational forum where present-days descendants of Bataan Death March (and other WW2 events) heroes shared their families' stories. I was one of the storytellers, and for this issue I would like to share with you my grandfather's story. I had a tough time choosing which story to share, as I had two relatives who survived the march, both of whose stories were very compelling in my admittedly biased opinion. In the future, I might still get to share my uncle's story.

This is the story of my lolo, my mother's father – Tristan Nubla MD (Captain, USAFFE Medic Corps) - born in 1914 to the Filipina wife of a rich Chinese trader, and thus to what our pure-blooded Chinese relatives refer to as the illegitimate side of the family.

He finished Medicine at the University of Santo Tomas in Manila. He was conscripted to the Medic Corps of the United States Armed Forces in the Far East, and, not long after, found himself fighting for dear life in Bataan when the Japanese

invaded. As we know, they eventually surrendered, and thus began what is now referred to as the Bataan Death March.

Malnourished, dehydrated, exhausted, and baking in the intense and stifling heat of the Philippine summer, my lolo did not think he could go any farther. He heard that Japanese death squads were at the tail of each marching unit, all too eager to decapitate or impale any stragglers unable to keep up. He turned to the person marching beside him - and I've no idea whether they were buddies or just happened to be next to each other - and told him that he would not be able to make it; and, if the other person survived, if he could find his wife and children, let them know he loved them and was thinking of them when he met his death.

If we were this other person, how would we have replied? I think most of us would say something like "Yes, I promise to look for them", perhaps even look after them. And maybe mutter "I'll pray for your soul."

But this person said "No, I won't do that.", followed by "I won't let you die here." He then did the unthinkable and lifted my grandfather onto his back, and carried him the rest of the way, however long there still was to go. Maybe they were truly close and he loved my grandfather so. Or maybe he didn't know him at all, that he was just sick of seeing so much death that he couldn't bear to let another person die if he could help it. Or maybe he had a death wish himself and he knew that carrying my grandfather made it more likely for both of them to perish.

I've often wondered how different our family tree would look like if not for that supreme act of love and selflessness that this person showed my grandfather. My grandparents ended up having a brood of 6. At

the time of Bataan, there were only 2, my mother being less than a year old. Two thirds of our clan would not be around today. My grandfather would not have built a hospital in Caloocan City in 1964, the year my mother graduated from medical school, and of which he served as Medical Director until his passing in 1982. It would have been unlikely that my mother would herself have become a doctor.

My mom recalls that when they were children, they would visit this person's family, and would spend Sunday afternoons with them, the kids playing in the fields, the wives puttering in the kitchen, and the two grown men sitting next to each other on the porch, looking out and seemingly without even exchanging words between them. Not that there was any need to. In their silence, there was already much that is said.

And the only other thing my mother remembers is that the person's name was Paraiso.

A Message from Across the Lake

First of all, I am happy and honored to become a member of the Philippine-Minnesotan Medical Association. I would like to thank Dr. Purisimo Lucas for nominating me. I have been living in Michigan ever since I came to the USA in 1966, right after graduation from the medical school at the University of the Philippines.

My life in the US was not extraordinary. I had my internship at Grace Hospital in Detroit and had my General Surgery Residency at William Beaumont Hospital in Royal Oak, Michigan. After finishing my training, I moved to Gaylord, Michigan with my family in 1973. I practiced medicine 30 years and retired in 2010.

About 40 years ago, while I was still in practice, I started a hobby of painting landscapes during my free time. Now that I am retired, it consumes most of my time. The first thing I want to say about painting as an art is that it is a work in progress of a lifetime. It is a slow learning process and there are no shortcuts. It never ends for as long as you live.

When I was a little boy, I watched somebody painting with watercolor. It remained in my memory and since then I have always wanted to paint. Painting as an art, reflects your personal way of looking, of doing, and of thinking, about the things we deal with in life.

I was born in the Barrio of Ilocos Norte and so I love to paint trees, fields of corn, clouds, sky, sunlight, etc. My style of painting is impressionistic but done loosely. I like to do things the quickest way creatively henceforth loosely. I don't go for minute details. However one wants to paint, it should follow the rules of color, values (the lightness or darkness of things), and composition. I paint mostly on location (plain air) which is the best way to learn by studying nature.

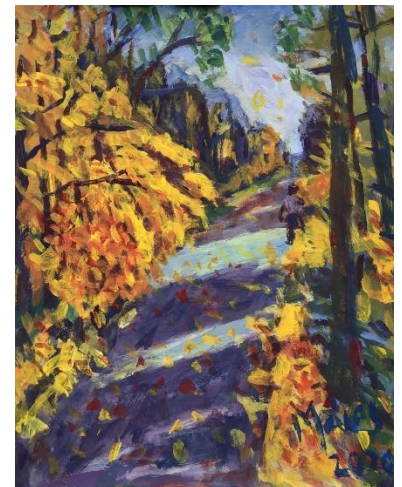
I paint almost every day during summer, spring, or fall. In the winter, when the temperature is above 30F, I

am out painting the snowbank, shadows of trees on the snow, etc.

Since I started painting, I have almost a thousand collections- sold some, gave away some.

Looking at them, I could see the progress through the years. Progress is not achieved in a straight line upwards. Sometimes you reach a plateau and not making any progress at all but keep on painting and then all of a sudden something clicks - you advance, then you get surprised. You read books, magazines, attend workshops, enter into competitions and talk with other artists.

There are sacrifices and rewards in painting. It feels good when you come up with a good one. When it is not so good, don't despair. Keep on painting!
